Improving on performance

Motshekga pleased with provinces' matric results, specifically commending the Eastern Cape's progress

PERFORMANCE at district levels came into sharp focus yesterday when Basic Education Minister Angie Motshekga and her deputy, Mohamed Enver Surty, outlined the interventions made to improve learning and teaching.

Motshekga pointed out that there was a need to focus on matters of quality and efficiency at district levels. She said the commitment to the nation was that they would deal with those two areas.

The success of the interventions she outlined were evident in the 2014 matric results in which no district performed below 50%. Only one district in the Eastern Cape performed below 50% in 2013

In 2014, only one district performed under 80% while in the Free State four out of five districts performed above 80%. In Gauteng, 13 out of 15 districts performed above 80% while all districts in the Western Cape performed above 80%.

The districts in other provinces also performed between 70% and 79%.

Motshekga particularly praised the Eastern Cape for its constant improvement in education performance. The province was always under the spotlight for being at the bottom of the list of other provinces regarding performance in the matric results.

"In maths and science, the Eastern Cape always does well. The people of Eastern Cape are doing well to get the province out of the quagmire. The thing is that those (provinces) at the top don't want to let go. The Eastern Cape is trying hard," Motshekga said.

Surty also added that the Eastern Cape has for the past four years never performed below 50%. Last year, the province achieved 65.4%, an increase from 64.9% in 2013.

"At the foundation phase, it's no longer at the bottom. We are creating conditions conducive for learning and teaching. We are building schools and bringing IT there. placed the province on is improving," Surty said.

But Motshekga became almost emotional when she spoke about so-called community protests particularly in Malamulele where children was a recent of form at trading school and

protests particularly in Malamulele where children were prevented from attending schools and some institutions torched. She said some 300 children migrated to Gauteng from Malamulele to attend school.

"Our children want to study. Some children are more responsible than adults. What has

happened there was extreme barbarism. Some of those responsible are doctors. They are educated people denying children education. This is a lack of morality."

Motshekga also pleaded with the private sector to lend a hand in the improvement of the education system through the National Education Collaboration Trust.

The trust is the brainchild of FirstRand chief executive Sizwe Nxasana and aims to strengthen partnerships between business, civil society and government to support reforms in education.

Quality assurance body in education Umalusi chief executive Dr Mafu Rakometsi speaking from the floor, said his observation over the years was that the education system was improving.

"From year to year on subjects, there is an improvement. It's an improvement that is sustainable.

"This has also been observed in the outcomes that we get every year," Rakometsi said.
