

Hello everyone. This week's focus is on adverbial clauses.

Adverbial clauses improve the quality of writing by adding more detail and making one's work as useful and informative as possible.

Adverbial clauses must:

- ✓ Have a subject and a verb.
- ✓ Begin with a subordinating conjunction.

Examples of Subordinating Conjunctions:

✓ After, if, because, and, although, until, unless, even

Adverbial clauses are flexible and can be placed at the *beginning, middle* or *end* of the sentence.

At the **beginning** of the sentence an adverbial clause is followed by a comma.

e.g. Unless you run fast, you will miss the bus.

When placed in the **middle** of the sentence an adverb clause is offset by commas.

e.g. Elephants, although they are large, are not predators.

No additional punctuation is needed when an adverbial clause is at the **end** of the sentence.

e.g. You need to keep calm even if everyone else panics.

Learners must be able to use and identify adverbial clauses especially when they are Reading and Viewing.
