Topic: Adverbs of degree

Message Objectives: To help learners:

- understand what adverbs of degree
- know how to use adverbs of degree

Message:

Adverbs of degree are used to express 'how much' (or to what extent) we do something. Common adverbs of degree include: *very, slightly, quite, totally, fairly, absolutely and extremely.* They always appear before the adjective, verb, or other adverb they describe.

We use adverbs of degree to *qualify* what we are talking about (e.g. I'm **really** happy / I'm **quite** happy / I'm **not very** happy)

Adverbs of degree can be split into two groups: adverbs that *intensify* the degree of something and adverbs that *weaken* the degree of something.

Adverbs that increase, or intensify, the meaning include words such as: *very*, *totally*, *completely*, and *absolutely* (e.g. *I'm totally convinced Sam will quit his job*.)

Adverbs that decrease or weaken the degree of meaning include words such as: fairly, quite, slightly, and a bit. (e.g I'm a bit late)
